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## New Staff Spotlight Ms. Danielle Shulkin



Hello BAIS Families! I am excited to be here at BAIS and to soon meet all of our lovely students and families. After arriving in the Gambia for the first time last week, I have been enjoying getting to know the area, trying out some local foods, and getting my house in order (with HUGE help from Leah John and the Maintenance Staff!). Now, I get to prepare for one of my favorite (and most exhausting) days of the year: the first day of school!

New beginnings like the first day of school can bring up many different feelings in children and adults alike–feelings of excitement, trepidation, motivation, sadness, nostalgia, etc. Throughout my years of teaching at public and private schools in New

York City and San Francisco, and as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Panama, I have experienced all of these emotions and more. I remember my first day of teaching clearly; I was a fresh college graduate who had moved to NYC only 2 months previously and I was about to start teaching 8th-grade Humanities at a public school in Manhattan. As unfamiliar students began trickling into my classroom, I grew suddenly nervous. *What if they don't like me? What if I forget what I'm supposed to do? What if they start yelling and don't listen to a word I say? Who's in charge here?!* Realizing that *I* was the one in charge was simultaneously comforting and alarming.

Luckily, I had a knowledgeable, experienced co-teacher to lean on for support. Despite my youth and naivete, she always recognized my ideas and validated my teaching instincts. Having a mentor like this allowed me to develop confidence in my own skills as both an educator and a mentor to my students. My foundational years in teaching built upon the classroom learning I had undertaken as both a university student at the College of William & Mary and as a master's degree student at St. John's University where I was able to deepen my understanding of Special Education and neurodiversity. I have been blessed to have incredible mentors along the way who have illuminated the path forward while allowing me to create my own journey, and I hope to be that type of mentor for your children.

Stepping into the new role of Leader of Learning Support is an exciting challenge that I take on with gusto (as well as all those first day feelings!). I look forward to partnering with the BAIS families and faculty to ensure *all* students are appropriately challenged, seen, and valued, and I hope to learn from and with you all along the way.

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
