Technology Update

Middle School Chromebook Usage at BAIS and at Home

It sounds like a great initiative to provide middle school students with Chromebooks! To support this effort, I can remind students of the importance of caring for their devices during their classes and at home. Here are a few steps I can take:

- **1. Emphasize Responsibility:** I'll discuss the importance of taking care of the Chromebooks, highlighting how to handle them properly, such as keeping them in their padded computer bags carried from one place to another, opening and closing the device gently, avoid pressing on the screen –in short-handle them with great care.
- **2. Daily Reminders:** I'll remind students each day to fully charge their Chromebooks the night before coming to school the next day and to bring their chargers with the Chromebooks to school.
- **3. Usage Guidelines:** I'll reinforce that Chromebooks are for school work only, explaining the potential consequences of misuse or damage.
- **4. Digital Citizenship:** I'll incorporate lessons on digital responsibility, teaching students to appreciate and use their devices appropriately. If there are any specific guidelines or rules you'd like me to stress, please let me know!

College Counseling Corner

Welcome back to BAIS and I hope everyone is having a great start to the school year! I'm very excited to share that I'll be serving as College Counselor, supporting students in their post-high school journeys. As a brief introduction, I'm currently finishing my PhD in African Art History at Yale University and have been coming back and forth to West Africa since 2017. Over the last 4 years, I've worked with Yale Young African Scholars to support high achieving students from the continent apply to schools around the world. In that role, I've worked with admissions counselors from all over and helped students earn admittance (and full rides) to schools including Yale, MIT, Oxford, Trinity College, UPenn, UC Berkeley, Dartmouth, Princeton, Cambridge, and many others. I also worked for Yale's Fellowship Office, where I've served on committees in charge of allocating funds and selecting winners for a variety of scholarships. Previously, I interned at the Amherst College admissions office and saw the ins-and-outs of the admissions process.

Over the next few weeks, I will be meeting with all of the high school students to set up college plans. I'll be particularly focusing on working with seniors, but also want to speak with the other years as well to get a sense of their interests. We will also be hosting a college night this Fall, where I will share information to demystify the application process, share key information about schools internationally, and answer any questions parents and students may have. New Staff Spotlight Mr. Sang Jain "My Second Round"



I practiced teaching for over forty years, sixteen of which have been at BALS. In the course of my career, I have served as Head of Science Department at Senior Secondary Schools, Principal in an international school, Senior Lecturer at Gambia College, and Training Coordinator and the Supervisor of the Teaching and Learning at SOS Training and Production Centre. Also served as Examinations Administrator at the West AfricanExaminations Council for fourteen years.

As a science teacher, I try to make science content more personal by linking it to students' lives, which helps them to identify with science. In addition, I encourage hands-on

activities, research work, modeling, developing and using models, and finally constructing explanations and designing solutions. This helps the students improve their observational and manipulative skills and enhances a greater understanding of what has been learned.

In 2016, I attended a Training Programme at the University of Cambridge, England, on teaching at International Schools. This year, I went to Washington DC, USA, to attend the AERO Conference. The goal of the conference is to deepen relationships and foster competencies within a standards-based framework, with the aim to improve instructional coherence. It provided a guide that enhances an insight into how these strategies can be woven into everyday teaching to facilitate instructional effectiveness.

With this knowledge and the dedication and passion for teaching, I have facilitated my 'Coming Back' to BAIS as a Science teacher, after eight years of break.

Finally, in conclusion, I am married with four children (3 boys & amp; 1 girl) and two grandsons.
